# WIJK AAN ZEE 2025

## YOUTHFUL PODIUM IN WIJK AAN ZEE

The coastal Dutch village of Wijk aan Zee hosted the 87<sup>th</sup> edition of Tata Steel chess festival 2025, from January 17<sup>th</sup> to February 2<sup>nd</sup>, in its traditional lodge of De Moriaan, under the auspices of the regional steel industry.

All early editions of the tournament since 1938 until 1967 were accommodated in the nearby mother city of Beverwijk with just a single break during the entire history of the event - in 1945 - owing to the end of the Second World War. In 1968 "The Wimbledon of chess" moved to Wijk aan Zee where all other editions ever since have taken place. The record number of victories in the crown group of the festival, the Masters, still belongs to Magnus Carlsen - 8 in total including one shared, ahead of Vishy Anand - 5 (3 shared), Max Euwe - 4 (1 shared), Levon Aronian - 4 (2 shared), Victor Korchnoi and Lajos Portisch - 4 each.

The Masters was this year a category 20 event with 14 top grandmasters of an average rating 2726. The participants' lineup included 5 players from the world's top ten: Fabiano Caruana (USA), Indians Arjun Erigaisi, Gukesh Dommaraju (The fresh World Champion), Nodirbek Abdusattorov (Uzbekistan) and Chinese Wei Yi (winner of 2024 edition).

The host country was represented by its 3 leading active players: Anish Giri (3 times winner of the Masters), Jorden van Foreest (winner of 2021 edition) and Max Warmerdam-the reigning Dutch champion.





# PRAGUE INTERNATIONAL CHESS FESTIVAL 2025

## INDIAN DOMINANCE IN PRAGUE

The seventh edition of the Prague International Chess Festival (PICF) was held on February 26<sup>th</sup> - March 5<sup>th</sup> at its traditional home, hotel Don Giovanni. Starting in 2019 the chess festival aimed to “allow top Czech players, national team pretenders and aspiring juniors a chance to face the world’s top players on home soil”.

In just a few years it has become a major chess gathering for all levels and ages. 853 participants from 53 countries competed this year in 20 different events, skillfully organized by Nový Bor chess club (Novoborský šachový klub) under the leadership of the indefatigable director Petr Boleslav and chief arbiter Pavel Votruba.

The festival’s crown event, the Masters, was a category 19 grandmasters tournament won by the Indian Aravindh Chithambaram Veerappan on 6/9 points, a full point ahead of Anish Giri (Netherlands), Wei Yi (China) and Rameshbabu Praggnanandhaa (India) 5 points each.

The 25 year old winner was the only participant in the Masters to emerge unbeaten. He was twice (in 2018 and 2019) the Indian champion and last November won the Chennai GMs on tie break ahead of Levon Aronian and Erigaisi Arjun. His most brilliant and significant victory in Prague was scored in round 7.







# FISCHER RANDOM CHESS

## The Rise of Fischer Random Chess

Fischer Random, also known as Chess 960 or Freestyle Chess, is a dynamic and increasingly popular chess variant. It introduces a fresh perspective to the game by randomizing the starting positions of the pieces while maintaining the fundamental rules of classical chess. This innovation eliminates the reliance on deep opening preparation and encourages pure creativity and strategic prowess.

The legendary 11<sup>th</sup> World Chess Champion, Bobby Fischer, invented this modern format, believing it addressed several critical issues in traditional chess:

- Elimination of Opening Memorization: One of the biggest challenges in classical chess is the immense body of opening theory. Players often spend years mastering complex opening variations. In Fischer Random, this preparation becomes unnecessary, allowing players to focus purely on their ability to calculate and make strategic decisions over the board.
- Encouraging Creativity: Since opening theory is irrelevant, players must rely on their natural talent, deep understanding of the game, and intuition to navigate the middlegame. This restores an essential aspect of chess - unpredictability and ingenuity.

Fischer himself passionately advocated for the format: “The new, modern chess engines have changed the game of chess dramatically. Fischer Random is much better than the old chess; it is basically the same as traditional chess, except you get rid of the theory, and it is very easy to remember the rules. You can learn Fischer Random in practically 10 seconds! You have the same pieces, the same board - all you need is an electronic shuffler, and in one second, you have the starting position.”

Alternatively, players or chess arbiters can manually arrange the pieces according to the randomized setup.
